Sonnet 79 presents the first specific reference to a rival poet who vies for the young man's affections. Without losing his sense of moral superiority, the poet bitterly resents the other poet.

Sonnet 79. A Shakespearean Sonnet is a 14-line poem that follows a rhyme scheme of three quatrains and a couplet: abab, cdcd, efef, and gg. In addition, each line follows a pattern of iambic pentameter, five feet of unstressed and stressed syllables. The subject matter of a sonnet is almost always love.

Amoretti is a sonnet-cycle tracing the suitor's long courtship and eventual wooing of his beloved. The work begins with two sonnets in which the

speaker addresses his own poetry, attempting to invest his words with the power to achieve his goal (the wooing of Elizabeth Boyle).

Sonnet 79 argues that the other poet deserves no thanks, because the quality of his writing derives from the quality of his subject. The poet (line 2) claims that earlier he had exclusively had the young man's patronage, or that his verse had exclusively been devoted to the young man's virtue or honor.
